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# Goal: 75% reduction in new HIV infections in 5 years and at least 90% reduction in 10 years

Each community's End the HIV Epidemic Plan should include strategies that:

1. Diagnoses all people with HIV as early as possible
2. Treat HIV infections rapidly and effectively to achieve sustained viral suppression
3. Prevent new HIV transmissions by using proven interventions, including pre-exposure prophylaxis and syringe services programs
4. Respond quickly to potential HIV outbreaks to get needed prevention and treatment services to people who need them

# Background

1. Phase 1 will focus on the geographic hotspots of new HIV diagnoses in 48 counties, Washington DC, San Juan, Puerto Rico and seven states that have a disproportional occurrence of HIV in rural areas. Tarrant County is one of the counties that will receive funding over the next 5 years for new resources, expertise and technology to decrease the number of new infections by 75%.
2. Phase II will provide resources across the nation reduce new infections by 90% by 2030.
3. Phase III will implement intensive case management to maintain the number of new infections at fewer than 3,000 per year.

# **Each Community must identify the strategies that will be most useful to Ending the HIV Epidemic in their Area**

Strong Data Systems are needed to understand your community's epidemic profile in order to focus efforts on the populations that have the highest impact of the epidemic

- New Infections are highly concentrated among :  
MSM, African Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, American Indians and Alaska Natives, and those who live in the southern US.
- More than 1.1 million Americans are currently living with HIV
- 80% of new infections in the US in 2016 were transmitted by the nearly 40% of PLWH who either did not know they had HIV, or who had been diagnosed by not receiving HIV care
- In 2017, the number of new HIV infections in the US were approximately 40,000 per year
- One in 10 infections occurs among people who inject drugs

# How Do We Begin?

- Each Jurisdiction will develop their End the HIV Epidemic Plan
- Funds will be awarded by both CDC and HRSA to HIV Prevention Programs, and Ryan White Parts A, B, C and F Programs in the 48 counties and 7 states to implement their plans over the next 5 years
- Funds will be used to support initiatives that can reduce new infections and effectively End the HIV Epidemic.
- These efforts require an All Hands approach, and you and your agency will play a vital role in accomplishing this goal!
